Method Expanded (H)

In the previous lesson, we covered the three components of wisdom and how they may help us with our research.

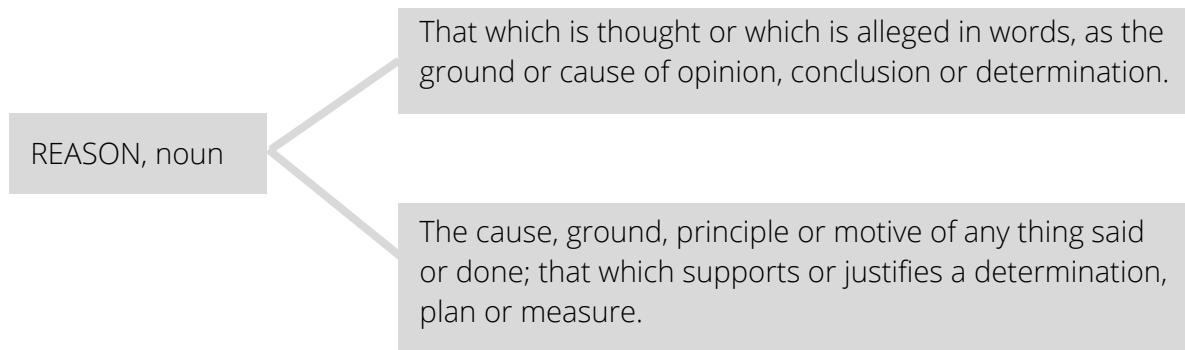
By now, you may have pieced together that reason questions help us with both research **and** reasoning through our topics—whether in life or in learning.

Before you get any further in this lesson, you may want to review the Method Expanded (F) and Method Expanded (G) lessons. This is for the purpose of looking back at the questions through the lense of both research and reasoning.



In this lesson, we're going to dive into the meaning of *reason*.

Webster's 1828 defines *reason* with two dichotomies:



Do those definitions sound familiar to you? They should. Take a look at Method Expanded (B) and read page 2.

Pay close attention to those dichotomies—observe them closely. Think carefully about the two words being defined (the one in Method Expanded (B) and the word *reason* in this lesson). Make comparisons and contrasts.
