Principles of Liberty Expanded (B)

In the previous lesson, we focused primarily on the internal qualities of God's Principle of Individuality, the Principle of Self-Government, and the Principle of Quality/Christian Character.

Before you get any further in this lesson, you may want to review Module 4, Lesson 3 and refresh your memory on the Principles of Liberty.



The next principles on our list are: Private Property (conscience) and the Biblical Form of Government.

Our first principle is *Private Property*. Let's go ahead and define the words *private* and *property* using Webster's 1828 Dictionary:



PRI'VATE, adjective [Latin privatus, from privo, to bereave, properly to strip or separate; privus, singular, several, peculiar to one's self, that is, separate; rapio, diripio, eripio; privo for perivo or berivo.]

1. Properly, separate; unconnected with others; hence, peculiar to one's self; belonging to or concerning an individual only; as a man's private opinion, business or concerns; private property; the king's private purse; a man's private expenses. Charge the money to my private account in the company's books.

PRI'VATE, noun A **secret** message; particular business. [Unusual.]

SE'CRET, adjective.

PROP'ERTY, noun

1. A peculiar quality of any thing; that which is inherent in a subject, or naturally essential to it.
